

Alfred May



Born in the Apr-Jun quarter of 1860 at Burneston,ⁱ Alfred made his census debut as a one year old in 1861, and he remained with his family for the next 3 census collections, being listed as a scholar in 1871, as a nurseryman in 1881, and promoted to nursery foreman by 1891 at which time he was 30 years old.ⁱⁱ

By the time of the 1901 census Alfred had married and had moved to Halifax where he had set up house at 20 Westbourne Terrace, Skircoat, and where he had found work that utilised his particular talents. We know he was married as he was listed thus in the census return.ⁱⁱⁱ

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But who and where was his wife? A check on the FreeBMD Index provides the answer. In the Jun-Sep quarter of 1899, in the district of Bedale, Alfred, aged around 38, married Caroline Richmond.^{iv} A further check of the census records indicates that Caroline was born in Carthorpe (or alternatively Masham) about 1875, so she was considerably younger than her husband. She was the daughter of Henry and Elizabeth Richmond but for the 1881 census was staying with her maternal grandparents at Brickyard Cottage, Carthorpe.^v

Caroline was back with her parents for the 1891 census, living a couple of doors down from the Burneston vicarage.^{vi}

The 1901 census confirms, with the birth of another daughter, that the Richmonds were a fairly mobile family before they settled in the Burneston area. This census also solves the mystery of where Alfred's wife was so soon after their marriage. She was with her parents and some of her siblings, at the same address as for the 1891 census. The work of labouring and shopkeeper is allocated respectively to mother and father.^{vii}

* Note, Grewelthorpe is the more likely place of birth as it tallies with the 1871 census, when Henry was at home with his parents.^{viii}

So why was Caroline not with her husband? She may just have been making a family visit. The family may have needed her help at that particular time – for instance who is the one year old visitor? Maybe Caroline was at home awaiting the birth of her own child? But at this stage it is not known if Alfred and Caroline had any children. Hopefully the 1911 census will provide some answers.
